Elections

Organize the election for the new freshman students. Use this as a way to prepare for elections throughout the year. Try out new methods of voting.

Welcome Back activities

Type:: Recognition

You may also want to use this opportunity to plan any first day of school activities to welcome back the students, faculty and staff.

First Meeting

Type:: Inspiration

Begin with an agenda and consider adding these items::

- Consider beginning with ice breakers, it has been a long summer.
- Remind everyone of their roles and responsibilities.
- If you don't meet over the summer the first meeting is also a great opportunity to set goals for your council.
- While setting SMART goals and establishing your calendar dont forget to discuss if you need to revisit your Constitution or by-laws.
- Set your calendar for the year, be sure to include meetings and your big projects.
- Discuss committees, which ones should you have, how should they be structured.

Leadership Opportunities

Type:: Inspiration

Tips and Tools

CT RISES:: PLANNING FOR THE YEAR by Christopher Tomlin

CASC is proud to launch a new initiative for the 2021-2022 school year:: CT RISES. The acronym stands for Citizenship, Recognition, Inspiration, Service, Engagement, and Spirit. Each council/government is encouraged to use CT RISES as they plan their projects towards building a successful year.

Step 1:: Make your Goals SMART

The Initiative begins with your council/government setting goals for the school year. These goals should be SMART – Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant and Timely.

<u>Specific</u> - Clearly state the task you are working toward <u>Measureable</u> - Track your progress to see results as you work

<u>A</u>chievable - Set a goal that is within a reachable level <u>R</u>elevant - Make the goal your own. Meet your own needs and desires for success

Timely - Use a tangible time frame to keep you on task

Think of goals as:

- What do we want to accomplish this year
- How do we want to leave our mark on the school
- Who will we influence and make a difference for this year

After brainstorming your goals for the year:

- Be sure to write the goals down the most successful people/groups in the world are those who have written goals
- Share the goals with everyone administrators, staff, student body
- - This will hold your group accountable
- Keep track of how you are doing with your goals
- Check off your list and CELEBRATE your accomplishments
- Evaluate

Step 2:: CTRISES – Creating Projects to support your Goals

Once your goals are written you will need projects to help you achieve them. Many times student councils get ahead of themselves and create project ideas first – don't do that! Write your goals – so you know what you want to accomplish for the school year. For example:

- Our student council will increase school spirit and pride by having more students attend homecoming dance and participate in dress up days.
- Our student council will raise 100 more dollars for the Special Olympics this year than we did last year.

Both of these goals meet the SMART guidelines on the page before. However, they do not tell HOW these goals will be accomplished. This is the job of PROJECTS (events)!

This is where the CTRISES categories come into play:

<u>C</u>itizenship:: Projects that promote student voice in the school and community.

Examples of Projects:: Election with elements found in US Elections, Get out the vote campaign, School forums

 $\underline{R}ecognition:: Projects that recognize students and staff.$

Examples of Projects:: Teacher Appreciation baskets, Teacher of the month, Support Staff of the Year

Inspiration::Projects that teach and promote student leadership.

Examples of Projects:: *Council/Government Retreats, Leadership days, Community leader guest speaker*

<u>Service</u>:: Projects that serve the needs of the school and or community.

Examples of Projects:: Cards for Hospitalized Children/ nursing homes, Blankets for Babies, Blood Drive

<u>Engagement</u>:: Projects that teach students and make the school a better place.

Examples of Projects:: *Anti-Bullying Program, Mock car crash, Ban the "R" word*

<u>Spirit:</u> Projects that improve school climate. Examples of Projects:: *Movie night, Freshmen Welcome, Pep Rally*

Try to consider doing one great, well-done and specific project per month. Planning a project takes many hours of meetings and commitment on the part of your executive board, advisor and council.
