KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

Willard R. Daggett, President of the International Center for Leadership in Education, is recognized worldwide for his proven ability to move education systems towards more rigorous and relevant skills and knowledge for all students. He has assisted a number of states and hundreds of school districts with their school improvement initiatives, many in response to NCLB and its demanding AYP provisions.

Dr. Daggett has spoken to hundreds of thousands of educators and education stake holders in all 50 states. His enlightening, entertaining, and motivating messages have helped his listeners to look at education differently by challenging their assumptions about the purposes, benefits, and effectiveness of American schools. Dr. Daggett inspires his audiences both to embrace what is best about our education system and to make the necessary changes to meet the needs of all students in the 21st century.

Pam Fisher directs the Great Maine Schools
Project at the Senator George J. Mitchell
Scholarship Research Institute in Portland,
Maine. Prior to her work with Promising Futures,
Pam was the principal of Noble High School
during its change from a traditional
comprehensive institution to small learning
communities aligned with the Coalition of
Essential Schools. The school has been
recognized for its successful work in high school
reform focusing on structures and practices which
aim to guarantee equity, rigor and personalization
for each student. The story of Noble's journey of
change is documented in *Breaking Ranks II*.

In 1997 Pam Co-Chaired Maine's Commission on Secondary Education which produced *Promising Futures, A Call to Improve Learning*

for Maine's Secondary Students. Promising Futures' Core Principles and Practices capture Pam's passion for equity of opportunity for all Maine children to access rigorous learning through a personalized experience. This report continues to receive national attention in the arena of systemic high school reform. The implementation of *Promising Futures* as a model for whole school change in Maine high schools has been dramatically increased through a generous grant awarded in 2002 from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.

Betty Despenza-Green is Director of the National High School Initiative of the Small Schools Workshop. She started at Chicago Vocational Career Academy as a teacher in 1972. CVCA, which serves a predominantly African-American student body on Chicago's south side, is one of the city's largest high schools, housed in a monolithic structure that covers 750,000 square feet. In 1991, with Dr. Betty Despenza-Green as principal, CVCA became one of the first schools in Chicago to begin the process of restructuring into small schools. CVCA has since become a nationally recognized model for small school restructuring.

This is how she describes the transformation in school culture: Teachers who once locked their doors, covered their windows, lectured for 50 minutes and then gave a pencil and paper test on Friday are now inviting administrators and other colleagues into their classrooms where students are actively engaged in cooperative learning activities, project-based learning and authentic performances. These same teachers are meeting before and after school, scripting lessons and engaging in reflective dialogue with their colleagues. They collaboratively review student work which informs their practice. They are reaching out to parents and other resources in the community. The entire school culture has changed - isolation has turned into collaboration and we now have the greatest school/business/community interaction that the school has ever enjoyed.
