Caring for Connecticut - State Service Project

Caring for Connecticut is an initiative to make 3,000 blankets by our March Convention. Every month, about 3,000 babies are born in Connecticut hospitals, so our goal is to make a blanket for every one. Blankets will be going to hospitals around Connecticut, and they will go to infants, babies, and children. Blankets can be made using only fabric and scissors, and they do not take long to put together. If your SCG stays after school one day for about an hour, you should be able to make a ton of blankets! Not all hospitals are taking blankets for infants at the moment, so there will be more information on distribution of completed blankets after the symposium. Our goal is to have local SCG's give blankets to local hospitals.

We will also have some additional, monthly projects- such as a friendship bracelet making project for children in hospitals and an appreciation card project for frontline healthcare workers. I am looking forward to working with all of you this year!

State Awards Program

CASC Council of Excellence Award.

Has been designated to recognize and reward the achievements of outstanding Student Councils or Student Governments in our state association. This award has been created as a way of providing encouragement and support to SCGs, as well as to provide standards of effective student leadership. To be eligible, your school must provide information related to your SCG operations, fundraising, communications, service learning, etc.

Top 10 Projects Award.

The top 10 project awards recognize Student Councils/Governments across Connecticut that have established a group project to better themselves, their community, or other communities. If your SCG is selected as a Top 10 Project, your SCG will be invited to present at our Spring Convention and receive recognition for your project. Submissions for this award will include a simple application, description of your project, and a 300 word essay about why your project should be considered for the award.

Dale Hawley Award

Individual student leadership contributions at the state level will be recognized this year through the Dale Hawley award. Dale D Hawley's life was dedicated to youth, service and the development of student leaders, as a principal and director of the National Association of Student Councils. This award is given based on nominations. If you have a student leader who exemplifies these values be sure to nominate them for this award.

The Ron Nedovich Advisor of the Year Award

This award is given in memory of the former Executive Director of Connecticut Association of Student Councils. Mr. Nedovich recognized the importance of leadership education, and development for all students. This award is to be given to one outstanding advisor, and will recognize the many contributions that advisors have made all over the state.

The District Project Award

TThis award was created to further foster collaboration among the districts. This award centers around district collaboration on projects related to service. It will function on two levels: first level will be a competition against schools within districts to choose a service project idea. The winning school will be the representative of the district on the next level where districts will compete to win the district project award title. Districts MUST work together to complete this project and should show proof. The winning district project and overall winning district will receive recognition.

CASC Crest Redesign Contest

Tips and Tools

GROUP DYNAMICS

Last month you were encouraged to set goals and standards for your SCG. This month we will look at improving Group Dynamics. Of all the tasks that we have to complete as advisors, setting aside parts of our limited contact time with our SCG's for training the student leaders to work with diverse groups is something that usually gets overlooked. Sure we work with them and coach them to face adversity when they run into difficult situations, but how often do we sit them down and explain that adversity is a natural part of the process in developing successful groups?

The following is taken from the NatSTuCo Distinguished Student Leader Program, if you have never checked it out I highly encourage you to take some time and read through the pages.

Group Development

(Based on the model developed by B. Tuckman, 1965) While the precise dynamics of a particular group are determined by many factors, to a large extent all groups undergo five basic stages of development:

Forming

A group goes through this initial stage when its members first come together as a collection of individuals unfamiliar with other group members. At this stage, you are instrumental in providing opportunities and a positive environment for initial group interactions.

Start by encouraging group members to introduce themselves. Never assume that people are acquainted, and when you are introducing people, try to think of one or two facts about them that others may find interesting.

Storming

Once the group has become acquainted, conflicts may arise over such issues as power, leadership, goals, and attention. These potential problems can be minimized by setting standards and modeling the desired behaviors. Often group members look to each other as guides for standards of behavior, particularly in terms of the acceptable levels of criticism and conflict and the ways in which disagreements are handled.

Make sure that the message you are sending is consistent. Your body language should not encourage behavior that you verbally discourage.

Norming

During the third stage, conflicts are resolved and the group begins to function smoothly as a unit. These functions include working out compromises, encouraging participation, maintaining a conducive environment, and handling individual problems.

Performing

In the fourth stage, the group experiences maximum productivity and involvement. The group members recognize each other as being important components of the group.

Transforming

In the final stage, members come to terms with the end of the task/exercise and must decide whether or not to apply their experience to work with other groups in which they may belong and with future activities of the current group.
