Morning Workshops

Over the years, many issues have moved Peter, of Peter, Paul & Mary fame, to commit his time & talent: equal rights, peace, the environment, gender equality, homelessness, hospice care & education. Peter's talents as a creative artist - both with Peter, Paul & Mary & as a solo performer - are frequently directed at using music to convey a message of humanity & caring.

All of his creative & organizational achievements haven't caused Yarrow to rest on his laurels. On the contrary, they have given him the wisdom & the experience to address what he considers to be perhaps his most meaningful undertaking to date. This project, called Operation Respect: "Don't Laugh At Me," is based on his passionate belief that music, with its power to build a community & catalyze change, can be a particularly powerful tool as well as a source of inspiration for children. In his newest project, the song, "Don't Laugh at Me," is used to create a climate of respect in the schools of America. It struck Peter that the song with its arresting lyrics, "Don't laugh at me, don't call me names; don't get your pleasure from my pain," could serve as an anthem for the growing movement to build safer & more respectful environments for children. Over 450 of Connecticut's elementary schools have now been trained in Peter's Operation Respect program. Few of those trained have had the opportunity to meet Peter Yarrow personally. Now is your opportunity to meet and hear this man who is not about to give up the demanding path he's chosen. "We've lived through a time in which people have felt they could forge their own future & make a better world," he said. "We may not have achieved our dreams in the time frame that we once believed was possible, but the magnitude of what is yet to be achieved only confirms the importance of our commitment. Knowing this, we can't stop now."

How to Work Less, Play More, and Still Get the Job Done in a Normal School Week: Assuming Your Proper Role as Head Manager in Today's Education Environment

Now in its third year, this program has been proven to double the amount of time principals spend in classrooms coaching teachers, while simultaneously

reducing their work loads by 10-15 hours per week.

The program teaches principals how to implement management strategies designed to free them up from front office paperwork and bureaucratic "noise," and allow them instead to spend the majority of their time in classrooms where they can focus on improving instruction.

Operation Respect CT: The "Don't Laugh at Me" and "Respect Me" Initiatives

This session will focus on introducing both the "Don't Laugh at Me"(for elementary and middle schools) and "Respect Me"(for middle and high schools) model programs in Connecticut. The session will provide information about the curricular aspects of these initiatives, and the philosophical (non-programmatic) components that these two large efforts. Participants will gain an understanding about what the program goals are in the arena of "anti-bullying" and improvement of overall school climate.

4 Putting Theory into Practice: Social Development at Chester Elementary School

This workshop provides an overview of the Social Development Program that has been developed by administration, staff, and parents at Chester Elementary over the past five years. This program addresses school climate and student character, promotes community and service learning, teaches social and emotional learning, and provides special support programs. Outcomes and lessons learned as the program produced systematic change within the school will be presented. Participants will receive a program packet.

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8 Moving Beyond the Traditional Math Program
