From the Student Executive Board

Caring for Connecticut - State Service Project

Caring for Connecticut is CASC's year long service project. It will include a year-long blanket initiative and two month-long projects: friendship bracelets in April and appreciation cards in January. Every month, 3,000 babies are born in Connecticut hospitals. The blanket initiative aims for CASC-associated schools to create 3,000 blankets for local hospitals. Every district will have a designated hospital for blanket delivery. Blankets should be about 30" x 30", and scrap fabric can be purchased for 50% off at many craft stores, such as Joann Fabric. Respond to the <u>pledge form</u> to help with the blanket initiative. Here is an informative video to help make the blankets. The friendship bracelet initiative will take place in April, and students across the state will make friendship bracelets for children in Connecticut hospitals. For the appreciation card initiative, students will create appreciation cards for frontline workers in hospitals across the state.

State Awards Program

CASC Council of Excellence Award.

Has been designated to recognize and reward the achievements of outstanding Student Councils or Student Governments in our state association. This award has been created as a way of providing encouragement and support to SCGs, as well as to provide standards of effective student leadership. To be eligible, your school must provide information related to your SCG operations, fundraising, communications, service learning, etc.

Top 10 Projects Award.

The top 10 project awards recognize Student Councils/Governments across Connecticut that have established a group project to better themselves, their community, or other communities. If your SCG is selected as a Top 10 Project, your SCG will be invited to present at our Spring Convention and receive recognition for your project. Submissions for this award will include a simple application, description of your project, and a 300 word essay about why your project should be considered for the award.

Dale Hawley Award

Individual student leadership contributions at the state level will be recognized this year through the Dale Hawley award. Dale D Hawley's life was dedicated to youth, service and the development of student leaders, as a principal and director of the National Association of Student Councils. This award is given based on nominations. If you have a student leader who exemplifies these values be sure to nominate them for this award.

The Ron Nedovich Advisor of the Year Award

This award is given in memory of the former Executive Director of Connecticut Association of Student Councils. Mr. Nedovich recognized the importance of leadership education, and development for all students. This award is to be given to one outstanding advisor, and will recognize the many contributions that advisors have made all over the state.

The District Project Award

TThis award was created to further foster collaboration among the districts. This award centers around district collaboration on projects related to service. It will function on two levels: first level will be a competition against schools within districts to choose a service project idea. The winning school will be the representative of the district on the next level where districts will compete to win the district project award title. Districts MUST work together to

complete this project and should show proof. The winning district project and overall winning district will receive recognition.

CASC Seal Redesign Contest

To help celebrate 70 years of CASC, we are looking for your help in designing a new Seal that will be used by CASC in a variety of mediums. The design must have a reference to Connecticut. It must also incorporate the phrase "CASC" or "Connecticut Association of Student Council." CT General Assembly Update

CASC is excited to be working on several new legislative projects! Throughout breakout sessions at the Presidential Symposium we held, students discussed the changes they wanted to see in their lives, especially in education. We are taking action on students' voices. Therefore, we are writing legislation on the following topics students discussed: Delaying high school start times/swapping elementary school and high school start times, equity in the number of times students take the SAT, waiving P.E. credit requirements for student athletes, increasing the minimum required lunch time, and implementing crucial life skills into curriculums. Student councils and governments will also be receiving a Google Form where they can submit legislative changes they want to see at any time! Once Connecticut's legislative session resumes in February, these bills can potentially become laws!

Tips and Tools

POINTS

As advisors we always struggle with member participation. How much do we expect our members to do? How do we reward those who do more? How do we hold those who do less accountable?

I have used a point system with my group since 2007. In those years since we first introduced it, it has gone through several iterations; there were times it was highly complex and specialized (You name it, it had a point total attached to it), there were times it was very simple and universal. Below is the system I use now with my group. Notice the titles of each section, as much as possible I use the NSC (National Student Council) language, in this case tennants, in all of my materials as a way to anchor our group to something larger, hence the titles for each section.

Service and Engagement - 20. The minimum amount of hours each member is required to work at Student Government projects. (setup/operating/cleanup) To earn these members must sign in AND sign out at the project. I round to the nearest half hour for this one and it usually isn't a problem, the biggest problem is reminding members to sign out.

Earlier in my career I used to award hours for work done outside of school on members' own time. But I stopped this after I began to notice that each year the amount of hours was going up and at the same time physical participation at projects was going down.

Leadership - 4. The amount of completed projects that a member has to take a leadership role in. This ties into our use of committees. One of the questions that always arises is how do you you hold committees accountable? What if you have a committee that does nothing all year? We have this chart in our meeting room::



The visual is great for inspiration and accountability. In the first column are pitches, ideas for future projects. Then there are the committee columns with the Senate column on the end, once it is approved in the senate it goes back to the committees to run. Each committee then has their own column. Top - ideas they are considering Middle - Projects they are currently running Bottom - Projects that they ran.

Voice - 2. The amount of resolutions a member has to put forward and have advanced to the President's desk. We are a Student Government so we use "governmental" terms. Resolutions are written ideas to make the school better that would need to be enacted by administration. (add ECE classes, senior "privileges", etc)

Tying it all together, regardless of your point system, highly complex, incredibly simple. You need a carrot, an award or recognition for hard work that helps the members buy into it. I give out lanyards, certificates and other tchotchkes when members make certain milestones. The important thing when selecting your "carrot" is you want to keep your language positive, participation should not be a punitive part of your council's life.
