Tips and Tools

The 5 P's of Productive Meetings

Adopted from various sources

Meetings get a bad rap, people love to hate them. At some point we have all sat through a meeting and thought it was a gigantic waste of time. However, we have also sat through amazing meetings where we knew it was worth every minute spent there. As advisors, our job is to help students realize that properly run meetings actually help you to be more productive, not less! And that meetings can actually save you time instead of wasting it. These 5 P's of productive meetings should apply to all of the meetings you hold. If a meeting goes wrong, or a committee becomes less effective you now have a place to begin your conversation with the chair.

1. Purpose.

Every productive meeting must have a clear purpose. Participants should know what the meeting is for. The purpose should be worth pulling people away from other opportunities. Ask yourself:

- Why are we meeting?
- Can the same thing be accomplished by an email?
- What do we need to accomplish?
- What are the meeting's goals and objectives?
- What are the meeting deliverables?
- What will be different for us as a result of our meeting?

2. Preparation.

Preparation is key to productive meetings. Projects and Tasks need to be updated to reflect the current reality. Every attendee should come prepared to share their perspectives in order to achieve the purpose.

For example, preparation could require that anyone whose goals or tasks are falling behind needs to arrive prepared to discuss what is happening and to provide recommendations for how to move things forward.

3. Process.

Productive meetings have a clear process, which is defined by an agenda. Your agenda should describe

specifically what topics will be discussed and in what order so that participants know what to expect and how to prepare appropriately. Ideally, you should have a standard agenda for every recurring meeting.

Ground rules are also required. Ground rules spell out the rules of the road for how to behave and interact in your meeting. Ground rules clearly articulate and encourage the desired behaviors and discourage the undesired behaviors that derail meetings. Properly communicated and enforced ground rules will take care of 99% of dysfunctional meeting behavior. Ground rules give you and other participants the "permission" to redirect derailing behavior. Ground rules need to be clearly articulated and agreed upon at the start of the meeting. Make sure that participants know that it is EVERYBODY'S JOB to enforce the ground rules.

Examples of Rules

Here is a small subset of rules to incorporate into your meetings, they work with or in place of Parliamentary Procedure(Robert's Rules of Order, TSC, etc.)::

- The meeting starts exactly on time.
- Phones must be turned face down and set to silent. Be in the moment, not multitasking with people or distractions who aren't there.
- Name the ultimate decision-maker in the room, and explain how decisions are made (voting, decree, etc).
- Only 1 person is allowed to speak at a time.
- Off-topic items will be "pinned or parked" and a follow-up task assigned to one of the participants to start the research process post-meeting.
- Passionate debate is encouraged. But you must listen with respect. Hear the other person out without interruption before replying.
- Disagree then commit. You are allowed to disagree during the debates, but everyone must commit to the final decision the group makes.
- Unified front. No undermining or criticizing of decisions after the meeting will be tolerated.

- A Task is a promise. You are expected to keep your promises.
- Due dates are "commits" not "hopes". Don't give a date by which you "hope" to get the task done, commit to a realistic date that others can count on.
- Between now and the due date, it's OK to ask for help if you get stuck, or renegotiate your commitment if something happens outside of your control.
- However, it is totally unacceptable to show up with an excuse on the due date with the task not done.

4. Participation.

Productive meetings are characterized by the participation of everyone who has been invited. The Chair should make sure everyone present is given the opportunity to speak and be asked to share their opinion, and not just let the louder, more extroverted members dominate the discussion. The Chair should always talk last in discussions and vote last. (Also it is a good practice that if there is a tie vote before the chair votes, that they vote in such a way as to preserve the status quo.)

5. Progress.

In a productive meeting, everyone should make progress. They should leave the meeting better off

than when they entered. Decisions need to be made and documented. Everyone should leave with clarity about what needs to be done next, by whom and when, to move the Goals forward.

One of the biggest blunders people make when leading meetings is failing to record, recap, and follow-up on action items and next steps as meeting outcomes. Because most meetings create work and action items for the participants, it is the responsibility of the Chair to ensure all action items are actionable and understood. Simply put, every action item needs to be articulated, recorded, and confirmed. Every action item needs three things: 1) Clear deliverable; 2) Owner; and 3) Due date.

Any progress achieved since the last meeting needs to be praised and acknowledged! Progress has been proven by research to be a key driver of member motivation. When people can see that they are making incremental progress, and receive acknowledgment for it, they are much more likely to feel motivated and engaged.
