The Legislative Affairs Committee is thrilled to announce that our Second Annual Mock Legislative Day was a huge success! We hosted over 65 students in conjunction with the Connecticut State Capital and fielded an overwhelmingly positive response. Our new caucus structure was highly successful and our body amended and passed legislation for an increase in the number of excused mental health days afforded to students, a mandatory lab element in the curricula for science classes, and a bill implementing community service as a high school graduation requirement. Expect updates as the bills are evaluated by the Connecticut General Assembly, and look out for opportunities to lobby at the Capital!

The Legislative Affairs Committee is far from done for the year- we are in the process of planning a legislative information session in December to encourage participation in the Connecticut General Assembly's Legislative Session beginning in January. We're also in the process of planning for some very special guests at our spring Convention.

I am thrilled with the progress we have made thus far and look forward to a phenomenal year of promoting legislative advocacy in Connecticut students.



Tips and Tools The Budget Committee, Philosophy, Purpose.

Adopted from "Challenge" November 1990

Student activities have regularly sought to support themselves by student involvement in money-making activities which provide an operating budget for various activities to sustain themselves without utilizing of tax resources. That philosophy indicates that if students believe an activity is important enough to keep within a school framework, students should be willing to support it actively by developing a budget through student resources without having the burden of financial support rest with the tax base.

Student Councils spend entirely too much time and energy raising money. Many clubs and organizations make the same mistake. However, the basic philosophy that students should support their own activities has been a sustaining philosophy-not that student activities are apart from the curriculum, but rather that money-making activities might be a part of the curriculum of student activities.

PHILOSOPHY

A budget and finance committee might indicate to the Student Council the kind of money available for the Council to operate so that its program will be controlled to remain within that financial framework. Basic philosophy demands that:

- 1. A realistic approach to available funds be understood by all members of Council.
- 2. A thorough consideration of various money-making activities might be given before a specific way for raising money is selected.
- Administration of this student money be carefully controlled-that no student funds be misused or misunderstood, that all go directly to the school treasurer and be recognized as the official funds of the school system and the individual school.
- 4. A careful budgeting and auditing procedure be made of student monies to assure that they be protected in the interest of the democratic society they represent.

DUTIES

The budget committee should meet with the school treasurer (or person responsible for school money) to discuss the basic philosophy regarding student funds. All monies gathered in the name of Student Council are official school funds and may not be spent in any way except that approved by Student Council and the school administration. (Connecticut State Statute, Sec. 10-237) If Saturday functions provide money for Student Council school money.

A thorough discussion should be held concerning procedures of the particular school in regard to the handling and spending of monies, the use of receipts, purchase orders, and other money procedures.

A careful study of the previous year's budget will give students a realistic approach to finances and budgets in student activities accounts.

The budget committee should thoroughly discuss various ways of making money, and the appropriation of these monies before presenting a proposed budget for the year to the principal, the treasurer, and the Student Council advisor as wella s the executive committee of Student Council before presenting this to Student Council itself and the student body as a whole.

This area of student funds is greatly misunderstood and can become a sore point for the student body which misunderstand the making and spending of student monies in the name of the school. The school treasurer might be the chairperson of the budget and finance committee which meets weekly to discuss student monies, the appropriation of these funds, and the application of these to the general purpose of Student Council.

This committee requires official supervision and can provide one of the finest communication channels of the administration toStudent Council when it understands that its duties are involved with the maintenance and protection of student monies for welfare of the student body that Student Council might function in the best educational regard for the student body.
