

Tips and Tools

Aim for Projects to Remember

Reprint from FOCUS... April, 1985

Let your Student Council/Government (SC/G) aim for projects that people will remember! The secret: plan it well; begin it wisely, and conduct it with enthusiasm-then-END IT WITH STYLE!

"Closure" means finishing, concluding, completing. Psychologists have told us the importance of "wrapping up" to retain the spirit and meaning of events in our lives. SC/Gs can improve meetings, assemblies, projects and retreats by deciding how to conclude them with a feeling of closure and "class."

Choose feelings, facts, ideas or experiences within the event that you want participants to retain. (For example, you may hope people keep a feeling of cooperation, and pride in cleaning up their school, or an interest in doing something kind for the less fortunate.) The SC/G should design a conclusion that will highlight, emphasize or even recreate the important elements of an event so that people will remember it.

Here are some specific samples:

Completing a workshop

SC/G leadership workshops use "letter to self" as part of closure. It could be used just as well at the close of a retreat or even a meeting (especially early in the school year).

At the end of the workshop, students are asked to reflect in writing on the workshop's impact on them and to specify objectives they wish to reach in the early portion of the school year. The letter is mailed in November. Students are surprised at how much they hoped to accomplish so early in the year and how much has actually happened. Composing the letter is an effective form of closure for the students, helping them to evaluate what they want to do in the coming year by a specific date.

Completing a project

Reporting successes and failure and making recommendations about future efforts are important forms of closure in any project. Design a concluding activity allows the SC/G to appreciate and thank students for outstanding jobs done, adding a positive element to the project.

Closing an SC/G meeting

Because we are often rushed for time in SC/Gs, the discussion frequently centers on the end of the period. A better closure is to present a summary of action taken and projections for the next meeting. This summary will help strengthen lines of communication: reports to constituent groups by representatives.

Concluding a special event

Designing a dramatic concluding activity for a series of events is challenging and fun.

The SC/G can plan an enjoyable program to bring the year to a fitting, memorable conclusion.

At the closing of a SC/G workshop, each student is given a stamped postcard which is self-addressed. The message asks whoever finds the card to return it, completing the circle of good wishes. Then students write themselves a message.

Each card is slipped into a plastic sandwich bag and a hole is punched in one corner. The bagged cards are

tied to helium-filled balloons, which were released together at workshop end. The sight of students releasing their balloons and messages into the sky is exciting! Each person cheers as balloons struggle against downdrafts before disappearing into the sky. The fun of getting cards back with messages is a bonus.

Reminders: Order materials way in advance and get a large crew to fill balloons. Notify local newspaper
